6 out of 10 of the world's poorest people are women Little change since 1995 when women made up 70% (UNDP).





- Confirmed that women use public transport more than men
- Women tend to be captive riders (for now)!
- Women tend to use bus transport rather than rail (especially once they have children)
- Data collection is incomplete (disaggregated / trip purpose etc)
- Accepted stereotypes of travel behaviour between men and women are still valid
- Personal security is a key factor (more than mencrime) in their mobility habits and choices (to the extent that they have a choice)
- Harassment is a 'daily' occurrence
- Women when a suitable alternative is presented are more willing than men to change from PT to 'anything' else
- → Toolkit for cities (Sp & En)



Women use and need different transport to men – but HOW and does it really matter?

- They make shorter length trips & they tend to trip chain so interchanges are more important
- They walk more & spend less on transport
- They use public transport more than men
- They are more concerned about security and safety
- They are 'time and financially poor' so plan trips - information is key
- They work more in informal economies
- They interpret information differently and use technology in different ways
